School Hours

Our school operates during the following hours: 8.30am – Students may arrive and play at the back of the school until 8.45am.

8.45am – Classrooms open and students can go to their rooms and organise their belongings for the day.

9.00am - Classes commence.

11.00am - First break.

11.40am - Classes resume.

2.00pm - Second break.

2.40pm - Children move to their classrooms while the music plays.

2.45pm - Classes resume.

3.30pm - End of day.

Please note that children cannot be supervised at school, prior to 8.30am. At 3.30pm children should be picked up. Children not being picked up immediatley after school should wait at the front of the school where there is a supervising teacher until 3.45pm.

All students should be picked up by this time.

Extreme Weather Conditions

Like all children in schools across the state, our students will be feeling the heat this week as we experience some very warm weather. We are fortunate that we have a large amount of shade available at our school, but in extreme circumstances we may ask the children to remain in classrooms during break times. This is also a good time to remind your children about the importance of wearing their hat at school and to bring a drink bottle to keep hydrated. As a recognized BARR (Bushfire At Risk Register) school we will close our school on days of catastrophic fire danger ratings.



School Uniform

It's wonderful to see all our students looking comfortable in their summer uniforms, and I'm sure many parents were amazed at how much their children have grown over the break. At St Ambrose Primary School, we take great pride in our appearance. Learning about appropriate attire-including hair, shoes, and accessories-is an essential life skill that we instil from an early age. Our school uniform also serves as a great equalizer. Welcome to an Exciting Year in Grade 5/6P!

A warm welcome to all our Grade 5/6P students and families as we begin another exciting school year! We hope you had a relaxing and enjoyable holiday and are ready for a fantastic year of learning, growth, and new experiences.

The start of the school year is always a special time filled with fresh opportunities such as renewing old friendships and developing new ones.

The students have settled in well, and they are approaching their learning with curiosity, enthusiasm, and a positive mindset.

Our Grade 6s were very excited to meet their Prep Buddies on the playground and support them to find their feet at St. Ambrose, and our Grade 5s are looking forward to the sporting opportunities available to them as senior students.

2025 Annual Tuition Fee

As communicated in our last newsletter, the following details the changes in tuition fees for the 2025 academic year.

Any decision to adjust tuition fees is never made lightly, nor without careful and thorough consideration of our students' needs and our school's capacity to provide an education experience that supports every student to flourish. We are also cognisant of the financial pressures that many families have experienced this year.

St Ambrose School too, is facing increasing costs in multiple areas of school operations, including WorkCover premiums, Child Safety compliance, risk management, teacher resources and professional learning, and higher central system costs.

Our tuition fees at St. Ambrose School are also influenced by the Commonwealth Department of Education's calculation of our community's ability to financially contribute to the operating costs of our school, known as the Capacity to Contribute, or CTC, which is reviewed annually.

School funding is complex, so I have included with this letter a simple school funding "explainer" which I hope will support your understanding of how government funds Catholic (and other non-government) schools and how tuition fees support our school.

To ensure that we can continue to deliver a personalised, high-quality education that is responsive to the diverse interests and academic, social and emotional needs of our students, it is necessary to adjust our fees in 2025.

As a result, St. Ambrose School 's annual fee schedule for 2025 will be:

Fees		2025 Budget
(One payment per family)	Family Fee	\$2,500.00
(One payment per family)	Capital Fee	\$ 200.00
Levies (for each child)	Curriculum	\$ 665.00
(for each child)	Swimming	\$ 30.00

This is an increase of \$9.00 per week on 2024 fees for one student and less for each additional student as the family fee and capital fee is only paid once per year per family.

If you have any questions or concerns regarding the fee increase, or wish to discuss your individual circumstances, please do not hesitate to contact me. We remain committed to keeping tuition fees as low and affordable as possible, and to working closely with our community to make this transition as smooth as possible.

Thank you for your understanding. We are grateful for your ongoing support and trust in our school.



Further information is available on the School Resourcing Standard through the Australian Department of Education.

Catholic schools (and other non-government schools) are funded through a combination of:

- 1. Commonwealth Government funding
- 2. State Government funding
- Parent contributions in the form of tuition fees and charges.

This is how the pieces of the pie fit together.

Baseline funding (the SRS)

There is an agreed annual amount that government funds every school to meet its students' educational needs. This is called the Schooling Resource Standard (SRS). Under this national agreement, the Australian and state governments together fund schools in line with the SRS.

The final SRS Base for 2024 was \$13,570 for each primary student, and \$17,053 for each secondary student.

In addition to this base amount, there are up to six loadings that can provide additional funding for student priority cohorts and disadvantaged schools.

To ensure that funding keeps up with changes in wages and other costs, the SRS base amount and loadings are indexed each year.

School fees have to make up the shortfall

The Capacity to Contribute (CTC)

For Catholic schools, the SRS base amount is then reduced by the school community's CTC. This can be as much as an 80% reduction.

The Capacity to Contribute (CTC) for each school is determined by the taxable income of the families attending the school, as reported annually to the ATO.

Schools are currently expected to recover the CTC shortfall in SRS funding through school fees.

Importantly, none of this government funding can be used for buildings and infrastructure in Catholic schools. Our buildings and infrastructure are funded by capital grants from the Commonwealth and/or Victorian governments, and by parent contributions through fees, school cash reserves and capital levies

NAPLAN 2025

Information for parents and carers



Why do students do NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is a literacy and numeracy assessment that students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 sit each year. It is the only national assessment all Australian students have the opportunity to undertake.

As students progress through their school years, it is important to check how well they are learning the essential skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

NAPLAN assesses the literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through the school curriculum and allows parents/carers to see how their child is progressing against national proficiency standards.

NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process. It does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance, but it can provide teachers with more information about students' educational progress.

NAPLAN also provides schools, education authorities and governments with information about how education programs are working, and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

Your child will do the NAPLAN tests online

Online NAPLAN tests are designed to provide precise results and are engaging for students. The tests are tailored (or adaptive), which means that each test presents questions that may be more or less difficult depending on a student's responses. This helps students remain engaged with the assessment.

Tailored testing allows a wider range of student abilities to be assessed and measures student achievement more precisely. A student's overall NAPLAN result is based on both the number and complexity of questions they answer correctly. Your child should not be concerned if they find questions challenging; they may be taking a more complex test pathway.

All Year 3 students will continue to complete the writing assessment on paper.

What does NAPLAN assess?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students are learning through their regular school curriculum.

Students sit assessments in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. The questions assess content linked to the Australian Curriculum: English and Mathematics.

All government and non-government education authorities contribute to the development of NAPLAN test materials.

Participation in NAPLAN

NAPLAN is for all Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students. ACARA supports inclusive testing, so all students have the opportunity to participate in the National Assessment Program.

Information on adjustments available for students with disability who have diverse functional abilities and needs is provided in the <u>National protocols for test administration</u>.

Schools should work with parents/carers and students to identify, on a case-by-case basis, reasonable adjustments required for individual students with disability to access NAPLAN.

To help inform these decisions, you may consult the National protocols for test administration (linked above), NAPLAN public demonstration site, the Guide for schools to assist students with disability to access. NAPLAN and our series of videos where parents/carers, teachers and students share their experiences in using NAPLAN adjustments.

In exceptional circumstances, a student with a disability that severely limits their capacity to participate in the assessment, or a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background, may be granted a formal exemption.

Your school principal and your local test administration authority can give you more information on adjustments for students with disability or the process required to gain a formal eventsion.



What if my child is absent from school on NAPLAN test days?

Where possible, schools may arrange for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the school's test schedule.

What can I do to support my child?

Students are not expected to study for NAPLAN. You can support your child by letting them know that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best. Some explanation of NAPLAN is useful to help students understand and be comfortable with the format of the tests, however, it is not necessary for parents/carers to do this. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the types of questions in the tests and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

ACARA does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN or the use of services by coaching providers.

How is my child's performance reported?

From 2023, NAPLAN results are reported against proficiency standards. There is a standard for each assessment area at each year level. Proficiency standards provide clear information on student achievement. They are set at a challenging but reasonable level expected of the child at the time of NAPLAN testing, based mainly

on what has been taught in previous years of schooling. Student achievement is shown against 4 levels of proficiency; Exceeding, Strong, Developing and Needs additional support.

A NAPLAN individual student report will be provided by your child's school later in the year, If you do not receive a report, you should contact your child's school.

How are NAPLAN results used?

- Students and parents/carers use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help identify students who need greater challenges or extra support.
- Schools use results to identify strengths and areas of need to improve teaching programs, and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review the effectiveness of programs and support offered to schools.

NAPLAN timetable

The NAPLAN test window is 9 days. This is to accommodate schools that may not have the capacity to complete the tests in a shorter time frame. The NAPLAN test window starts on Wednesday 12 March 2025 and finishes on Monday 24 March 2025. Schools will schedule the tests as soon as possible within the testing window, prioritising the first week.



Group Travel Authority

School groups travelling on the metropolitan public transport network can now book online at <u>ptv. vic.gov.au/grouptravel</u>. Regional bookings with V/Line can also be made online at <u>viine.com.au/Fares-general-info/Additional-pages/Group-Travel</u>. Victorian preschool, kindergarten and primary school excursion groups of 12 to 35 people travel for free on weekdays between 9.00am and 4.00pm (on metropolitan and V/Line services).

Touching on and off

PTV's data shows that passengers are not touching on as regularly as they were hefore the COVID-19 pandemic, particularly trams and buses. Touch on/off data is used to plan the level and frequency of services for your school and sends a positive message to the broader travelling public. We ask you regularly remind students to touch on and off every time they use their mykl on public transport, even if they have a mykl Pass or Student Pass.

30 Day Travel Passes



Travel Passes are designed for community organisations and schools to provide a valid ticket for students in crisis or experiencing severe financial hardship to continue to attend school and access support services. Schools can access 30 Day Travel Passes and give them to the most vulnerable students so they can remain engaged in education. To be valid, the pass must have a hole punched on the date it is given to the student.

PTV Approved School Student ID

Hundreds of Victorian schools are participating in the PTV Approved School Student ID program, making it easier for students and their parents to access concession fares and student pass products

The PTV Approved School Student ID is effectively your school's student ID card with the PTV logo This flexible option means students no longer need to arrange, pay for and carry the dedicated PTV School Student ID (available from stations/ticket agents for \$9) to travel on student passes or concession fares.

Schools must apply to PTV to include the PTV logo on the school ID card. For a school's ID to be approved

- the school's name
- the student's name
- the student's photo
- an expiry date no later than 28 February of the year after the student finishes year 12
- the PTV logo.



The existing PTV School Student ID is an option for students should your school choose not to participate.

It is the responsibility of the student to ensure they carry valid proof of concession entitlement (PTV Approved School Student ID or PTV School Student ID) when travelling with a Student Pass, or risk receiving a fine from an Authorised Officer. The PTV Approved School Student ID does not need to be valid for the duration of the student pass being purchased, only at the time of purchase
